








- The Nisqually Reservation was established by the Medicine Creek Treaty of 1854. The Medicine Creek Treaty Tribes ceded 2.5 million acres of land in exchange for reservation land, annuities, and provisions.



- In 1917 the 4,717-acre reservation diminished through allotment, and more significantly, through the condemnation of 3,353 acres by the Department of War (now the Department of Defense) as part of the creation of the Ft. Lewis military base. This led to the displacement of nearly three-fourths of the Tribe from our homeland.



HISTORICAL CONTEXT



The Quiemuth Resort and Village site on Hawk's Prairie was an integral part of Nisqually Peoples' traditional seasonal lifeways prior to American colonization.
